

Document Transcription Key:

[yellow]: words/numbers unclear or need to be confirmed

- [?] = unknown, [??] = longer unknown portions
- [words?] / [words] = word assumed, but in need of confirmation
- [illegible] = the words in question cannot be read, regardless of transcribing skill or familiarity
- [firstname, lastname] = both parts of the name are in question
- Firstname [lastname] = only the bracketed name is in question

[green]: personal notes concerning the entire page in question meant to be deleted as problems are solved

[cyan]: personal notes to clarify meaning within passages

It should also be noted that this transcription makes use brackets to indicate the form in which something was written or done, if it differs from the main body of text. [*crossed out*] would indicate that the words in the following sentence/phrase were crossed out.

Example:

[*crossed out*: [they walked to the store]]

[*crossed out*] indicates how the line was modified, and the inner bracket indicates what phrase was modified, so the actual text would look something like this: ~~they walked to the store~~.

Remaining: 161-242, 1-59 (if checking)

NOTE: Within the first 64 pages of the following transcription, such transcription marks will not appear – there was so little certainty that marking every doubt with color would leave the whole page yellow. Instead, everything appearing in brackets, regardless of whether a question mark is also inside, is unconfirmed.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Stillwater, Payne County, Oklahoma territory.

Section 1 - That said village of Stillwater is hereby divided into four wards for school purposes under act of territorial legislature passed and approved Dec. 5th, 1890, to wit. All territory within the corporate limits of said village north of 9th avenue and east of Main Street shall constitute the 1st ward; all territory in said village west of Main Street and north of 9th Avenue shall constitute the 2nd ward; all territory in said village south of 9th Avenue and east of Main Street shall constitute the 3rd ward; all territory in said village south of 9th Avenue and west of Main Street shall constitute the 4th ward.

Section 2 - This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

An ordinance relating to liquor dealers, fixing amount of license and penalty for violation of same.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the village of Stillwater, Payne County, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. 1 - It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, association, partnership or corporation to engage in the business of selling intoxicating liquors at retail within the corporate limits of the village of Stillwater or within two miles of the boundary lines thereof without first having made application and obtained a license therefor from the President and Board of Trustees of said village of Stillwater.

Sec. 2 - Any person or persons, association, partnership or corporation desiring to engage in the business of selling intoxicating liquors as provide in Section 1 shall present his application therefor to the said President and Board of Trustees, stating the time when he desired to commence and the lot and block in said village upon which he proposes to conduct said business. If upon the presentation of said application as aforesaid it shall appear satisfactory to the said President and Board of Trustees that the applicant has complied with the law relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors at retail as provided y the act of the Territorial Assembly, passed and approved December 24th, A.D. 1890, then such applicant shall be permitted to sell intoxicating liquors in said village of Stillwater upon payment to the village treasurer of the sum of two hundred dollars as herein provided.

Sec 3. - The said sum of two hundred dollars shall be payable quarterly in advance, and said license shall run from the first of each month in which the same is issued and upon failure to pay any such quarterly installment within five days after the same becomes due and payable any license issued as aforesaid shall be revoked; provided that no license shall extend beyond the time for which the applicant has given bond and obtained license from the board of county commissioners as provided by Act of Territorial Assembly referred to in section 2 of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. - When any such quarterly installment shall be paid to the village treasurer as aforesaid said treasurer shall deliver to applicant a receipt there for giving date, amount and the purpose for which it was paid and upon presentation of such receipt to the village clerk he shall issue a license to the applicant said license shall be signed by the President of the board of trustees attested by the village clerk and under the official seal of the said village. It shall state the date of said license, the name of the applicant, the time for which the same is to run and the lot and block in said village where the said business is to be carried on.

No such license shall be transferrable, nor shall the place of business be changed without the consent of the President and Board of Trustees, given or granted at any special or regular meeting.

Sec. 5. - All money paid into the treasury for license as aforesaid shall become a general fund and subject to the appropriation and payment of any debt, obligation or liability of the said village as may be determined by the said President and

Sec. 7. - Every person licensed as provided by this ordinance who shall give or sell any malt, spirituous and vinous liquors or any intoxicating drinks to any minor, apprentice, or servant under 21 years of age shall forfeit and pay for each offense the sum of twenty five dollars.

Sec. 8. - Any minor, apprentice, or servant who shall for the purpose of evading the provisions of the preceding section, falsely represent his age shall be deed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall upon conviction thereof be fined for each and every offense not exceeding the sum of twenty five dollars.

Sec. 9. - Every person so licensed under the provisions of this ordinance, who shall sell or give to any infirm, idiot, insane person or habitual drunkard any intoxicating liquors, shall forfeit and pay for each offense the sum of fifty dollars.

Sec. 10. - Every person who shall sell or give away any malt, vinous or spirituous liquors on the day of any general or special election or upon the day of any village election or at any time during the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, or who shall keep an open saloon after midnight or open the same before 5 o'clock in the morning

Sec. 11. - Every person licensed in the provisions of this ordinance who shall sell or give to any intoxicated person any intoxicating liquor, or who shall permit any loud, boisterous or unusual noises in or about his place of business calculated to disturb the peace and quiet of the neighborhood or village, or who shall keep an illgoverned and disorderly house shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined the sum of twenty five dollars for each offense and in addition to each penalty the President and Board of Trustees may revoke the license of any such offender and for the purpose of said revocation, record of any court showing the conviction of any person for the violation of any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed sufficient, without further proof.

Section 1: That whoever shall indulge in horse-racing, fast riding or driving in or upon the streets, alleys, or other places within the corporate limits of the said village of Stillwater, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars for each offence and costs of suit in any court having a jurisdiction of the same. The court may as a part of said judgement or that the defendant may be committed to jail until such fine and cost are paid, or otherwise discharged according to law.

An ordinance relating to disorderly practice and providing for the punishment of the same.

That whoever shall, within the corporate limits of the village of Stillwater, be guilty of any riot or about engage or participate or encourage or advise others to participate or engage therein shall upon conviction thereof in any court of competent jurisdiction be fined in any sum not less than three nor more than ten dollars for each offense.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its due publication.

Ordinance No 11

An ordinance relating to the prevention and extinguishment of fires.

Be it ordained by the chairman and Board of Trustees of the village of Stillwater.

Section 1. That no person shall set up or use a stove the top or side of which shall be within two feet of the wood-work of the wall or any portion of the building without protecting such wood-work with metallic covering so as to protect the same from taking fire from such stove.

Section 2. That in all cases when a stove-pipe passes through a roof or wood-work of any building such pipe shall be separated from the wood-work at least four inches by sheet-iron or other incombustible material and shall project above or beyond such roof or wall at three and one-half feet.

Section 3. That no person shall burn or cause to be burned any shavings or other material in the streets, alleys or other place in said town nearer any building than twenty-five feet and shall burn no such material when the wind is high or the weather extra dry.

Section 4. That no person shall carry or cause to be carried into the streets or alleys of said town any burning coals or brands unless the same are in a closed vessel.

Section 5. That no person shall throw or cause to be thrown any ashes upon the streets, alleys or other places in said town but all persons shall provide on their premises or such as may be occupied by them an excavation large enough to receive said ashes, and the same shall never be heaped so the same could be blown from the top.

Section 6. That all persons engaged in business in said town shall keep in their place of business or upon their premises at least one barrel of water headed up so that the same may be rolled

from one place to another, and upon an alarm of fire to sell or caused to be rolled said barrel of water to the place of said fire, that the water may be use in extinguishing the same, said persons shall also keep one or more buckets to be used in carrying or throwing water in case of fires.

Section 7. Upon an alarm of fire it shall be the duty of all able bodied male citizens of said Town to proceed to the place thereof and assist in every possible way int eh extinguishment and the preventing the spread thereof at any such fire said citizens who may be present in the absence of a fire chief shall be under the control and command of the Town marshal and in his absence the president or any member of the Board of Trustees may assume control in such cases.

Section 8. That any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect and the be in force from and after its due publication.

Ordinance No 12.

An ordinance relating to dogs and imposing a tax thereon.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Stillwater.

Section 1. That any person owning, keeping, or harboring any dog within the limits of the village of Stillwater shall pay a tax of one dollar on each male and two dollars on each female dog which shall entitle each person to keep such dog one year.

Section 2. That any person wishing to license a dog shall first pay to the village treasurer the sum required in section 1, taking his receipt therefor. On the presentation of this receipt to the village clerk he shall issue to the applicant a certificate containing a description of the dog licensed and stating that the person therein named has paid the required tax and is allowed and entitled to keep the dog described therein one year from the date thereof the clerk shall enter upon a book kept for that purpose a record of such license, the name of the person procuring the same, and the description and name of the dog if he or she have one.

Section 3. That the clerk on issuing a certificate shall also deliver to the party to whom the certificate is issued a metal tag bearing the letters [T. P] which tag shall be attached with a metallic fastening to a collar, at least three fourths of an inch wide to be kept constantly upon the neck of the dog licensed, and for said tag the clerk shall be allowed to charge 10 cents. When the clerk is satisfied that any check is lost he shall issue another check upon the payment of twenty-five cents.

Section 4. That it shall be the duty of the Town marshal to take up and impound in a suitable place to be provided by the marshal

at the expense of the Town, all dogs upon which the usual tax has not been paid, or which are found running at large without collar or checks as provided in this ordinance or when such dog cannot be safely impounded, to kill the same without delay.

Section 5. If the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or mayor as the case may be, shall deem it necessary, he is hereby empowered to order the muzzling of all dogs running at large within the limits of said Town, in such a manner that it shall be impossible for such dog to bite or injure any person or animal and it shall be the duty of the marshal to impound any unmuzzled dog found running at large while such proclamation remains in force.

Section 6. That it shall be the duty of the Town marshal to kill any female dog while in heat.

Section 7. That no license or tax shall protect any dangerous dog which shall annoy or endanger any person within the Town.

Section 8. That any dog impounded under the provision of sections 4 and 5 of this ordinance may be released upon the application of the owner thereof within forty-eight hours upon the presentation of a certificate that the animal tax has been paid or placing upon such dog a muzzle or check as may be required and the payment of marshal for impounding said dog. Any dog impounded and not released as above shall be killed and buried at the expense of the Town.

Section 9. That the marshal shall be allowed the sum of seventy-five cents for each dog killed and buried at the expense of the Town to be paid out of the Town treasuring from any fund not otherwise appropriated.

Section 10. That any person who shall keep or harbor

an unlicensed dog or who shall let an unlicensed dog run at large without collar or tag or who shall let a female dog run at large without a muzzle during the time in which Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall order the muzzling of all dog, shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars.

Section 11. This ordinance take effect and be in force from and after due publication.

Ordinance No. 13

[All parts of ordinance marked through with a large red 'X']

An ordinance relating to the duty of village marshal and fees and [endowment] of the office.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the village of Stillwater.

Section 1. Whenever a village marshal shall be elected or appointed as the case may be he shall within five days after such appointment or election file with the Village Clerk a good and sufficient bond in the sum of two hundred dollars to be approved by the chairman and Board of Trustees conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of such office as fixed by statute and ordinance.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the marshal to suppress all riots, disturbances and breaches of the peace and to apprehend all rioters, disorderly persons and other disturbers of the public peace of said Village. If such arrest be made in the daytime of any week day the offender shall forthwith be taken before a justice of Peace for examination. If such arrest be made in the night-time or on Sunday then the marshal shall take sufficient [?] or pledge for the appearance of the offender before the justice of the peace at 10 A.M. next week day and in case the offense cannot give bond or pledge, then he shall be confined in the Village jail until the time fixed in this ordinance for his appearance before the said Justice.

Section 3 When the marshal shall have knowledge of the violation of any ordinance or when information shall be given him by any officer of the Village concerning the violation of any ordinance, it shall be his duty forthwith to arrest the offender and bring him before the justice to be dealt with according to law.

Section 4. In case of resistance the marshal

his deputy or aid may call to his assistance any bystander or other person in the vicinity. Any person refusing when called upon for assistance as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 5. The marshal shall at the request of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees make all necessary inquiries and examinations under the ordinance relating to [fares] and see that said ordinance is complied with and report all violations of the same. For this purpose he shall be allowed access to all buildings by the owner or occupants thereof. If any person shall refuse admission to the marshal as aforesaid, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 6. The said marshal shall be paid a salary of Twenty dollars per month payable monthly and shall be allowed to collect such as is or may be provided by law for sheriffs and constables in similar cases, provided that the said Village of Stillwater shall not be responsible to said marshal for any fees aforesaid uncollected by said marshal.

Section 7. This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its due publication.

An ordinance relating to gaming forbidding the same and providing penalties therefor.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Stillwater Payne County Oklahoma Territory.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of the Village of Stillwater to maintain or keep any table or cards or any other article or apparatus whatever, useful or intended to be used in playing any game of cards or faro or other game of chance upon which money is usually wagered.

Section 2. Every person within the corporate limits of the Village of Stillwater who for gambling purposes keeps or exhibits any gambling table, establishment, device or apparatus, or is guilty of dealing faro or banking of others to deal faro or acting as lookout or game keeper for the game of faro, or any other banking game where money or property is dependent upon the result is hereby declared a common gambler and guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 3. Any person violating section 1 and 2 of this ordinance will be fined in any sum not exceeding (\$15) dollars.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its due publication.

Passed and approved this 31st day of March, A.D. 1891.

Ordinance No 15

An ordinance relating to licensing Billiard, Pool Tables and Bowling alleys.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Stillwater.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful from and after the passage, approval and due publication of this ordinance for any person or persons, copartnership or corporation desiring to engage in the business of keeping a Billiard Room, Pool Room or Bowling Alley to conduct said business without first having made application to the Chairman and Board of Trustees of said village and obtained a license therefor.

Section 2. Such application shall be made in writing at any regular or special meeting of said Board of Trustees and shall state the time and place where and when said business is to be carried on, and if for a Billiard or Pool Room or [?], the number of tables to be used in said business.

Section 3. Upon the granting of any such application as aforesaid, the applicant shall before commencing or continuing such business pay to the Village treasurer the sum of \$1.50 per month for each Billiard, Pool Room or Bowling Alley; provided that no license shall be granted for less than three months. Upon the presentation of a receipt from the Village Treasurer to the Village Clerk showing that the applicant had paid to said treasurer the amount fixed as above and for the time aforesaid, it shall be the duty of said clerk to issue to the applicant a license substantially in [?] as that now required by ordinance for licensing retail liquor dealers, and for which the clerk shall be entitled to a fee of 25 cents for issuing such license, to be paid by the applicant.

Section 4 That no person engaged in the business aforesaid shall permit any other game for profit or amusement except those licensed as in this ordinance provided, in the same room or bowling alley where said business is conducted.

Section 5. That no person engaged in the business aforesaid shall permit ay minor to pay at any game of pool or billiards or upon any bowling alley owned or conducted by him.

Section 6. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall eb fined in any sum not exceeding \$10 dollars.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and due publication.

Ordinance No 16

[All parts of ordinance marked through with a large red 'X']

An ordinance relating to the planting of trees upon the streets etc.

Whereas, the planting and growing of shade and ornamental trees contribute largely to the beauty of a town or city and

Whereas, A large number of the citizens and property owners of the village of Stillwater have manifested and expressed a desire to plant shade trees in front of their property, provided a uniform system could be adopted. Therefore

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the village of Stillwater

Section 1. That the planting and cultivation of shade and ornamental trees upon the streets of said village in hereby encouraged and solicited form persons owning lots in said village.

Section 2. That all persons planting trees, as aforesaid, shall set the same in a line ten feet from the front lines of their lots, and that take such method to protect the same as shall by them be deemed best; provided they do not obstruct the streets in any manner in so doing.

Section 3. Any person violating that clause of section 2, providing that all trees shall be set ten feet from the front lines of their lots shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten Dollars.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its due publication.

Passed and approved this 31st day of March A.D. 1891.

Ordinance No. 17

[All parts of ordinance marked through with a large red 'X']

An ordinance relating to the obstruction of streets and sidewalks.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the village of Stillwater, Payne County, Oklahoma Territory.

Section 1. That any person who shall unnecessarily obstruct any street, alley, sidewalk, crossing or other public place within the village of Stillwater with any vehicle, box, lumber, stone, brick, implement or other thing: or who shall place any dirt or rubbish in any street or alley or other public place or who shall dig any hole or excavation in any street, alley or other public place: or who shall fail to remove such obstruction or fill up such hole or excavation when ordered to do so by the village marshal, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten dollars: and each day that such obstruction shall remain after such order shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 2. That any person who shall ride or drive any horse or other animal upon any sidewalk, or who shall hitch any animal so that it gets upon any sidewalk in said village, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten Dollars.

Section 3. That any person who shall see or expose for sale at public auction upon any sidewalk or street in said village any goods, wares and merchandise or other property of any kind shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten Dollars: Provided that this section shall not apply to prohibit sales under process of law, nor the sale of livestock by auction or otherwise upon the streets of said village.

Section 4. That any person who shall sweep or throw or cause to be swept or thrown any paper, dirt, trash or rubbish in the streets,

public grounds or alleys of said village, or who shall dump or throw from any wagon or other vehicle any hay, straw, filth or rubbish of any kind in any street, alley or public grounds of said village, shall, upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten Dollars.

Section 5 This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its due publication.

Passed and approved this 31st day of March A.D. 1891.

Ordinance No 19.

An ordinance relating to the prevention of stock running at large and providing penalties for the violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Payne County, Oklahoma Territory.

Section 1. That from and after the due publication of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any mare or calf, mule or ass, cow, steer, bull or calf, sheep, goat or swine of any age to run at large within the corporate limits of the Town of Stillwater

Section 2. That when any animal mentioned in the preceding section shall be found running at large, if such fact shall come to the personal knowledge of the Town marshal, or he shall be notified of the same by any person, it shall be his duty at once to take and impound any such animal and if the owner is known he shall notify said owner within twenty-four hours of the taking and impounding of such animal. If the owner is not known or can not be found, it shall be the duty of said marshal to keep such animal five days unless owner called for and charged paid, to advertise that said animal will be sold in ten days, by putting up notices at three of the most public places in said Town, to pay the costs of keeping and impounding such animal. If the amount received for any such animal of any such sale shall exceed the amount of charges for keeping and expenses of sale, said excess shall be paid into the Town Treasury, and if the same is not called for and proof made that the party applying for the same was the

owner of the animal sold as aforesaid, the said amount shall be forfeited to the use of the town.

Section 3 The said marshal shall be allowed fees as follows to wit: for taking up and impounding any animal 50 cts per head, and 50 cts a day for each day the same is impounded and not claimed, and in case of sale the marshal shall be allowed the sum of one dollar for advertising and conducting such sale, provided that if the amount of such sale shall exceed Ten dollars the said marshal shall received 10 percent commission on the excess, and provided at further that the said Town shall not be liable for or pay any of such fees or commission.

Section 4 That the marshal of said town shall provide a suitable place for the impounding and keeping of any such animals and the President and Board of Trustees shall make all necessary provisions for the payment for the use and occupation thereof, as shall be just and reasonable.

Section 5 Any person who may have any animal taken up and impounded in any such pound under the provisions of this ordinance who shall stealthily or by force remove any such animal without having paid the charges thereon to the town marshal shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$10.

Section 6 If any person shall tether or picket any animal upon any vacant lot or block of ground in said Town, said tether or picket shall not be long enough to allow such animal to go upon the streets and alleys of the same. Any person violating this section shall be fined not exceeding ten dollars.

Ordinance No 20.

An ordinance relating to nuisances.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Payne County Oklahoma Territory.

Section 1. Any premises or part thereof which may be nauseous or offensive to any person or family residing near the same or to persons passing along the street or alley near the same or which may be in such a condition as to be detrimental or obnoxious to the public health or comfort, shall be deemed a nuisance; and any owner or occupant of such premises who shall neglect or refuse to abate such nuisance after due notice thereof by the Town Marshal or any person aggrieved thereby, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten dollars for each and every offense.

Section 2. Any place in which swine are kept which may be offensive or an annoyance to any person residing near the same or to persons passing along any street or alley near the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance, and the owner or keeper of such swine, or the owner and occupant of the premises who shall refuse or neglect to abate such nuisance after due notice thereof by the town marshal or any person thereby aggrieved, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars for each and every offense.

Section 3. Any nauseous, foul, offensive or putrid liquid, or substance, or any liquid or substance likely to become nauseous, foul, of-

-fensive or putrid, which may be discharged, placed or thrown, or flow from or out of any premises into any street or alley, or into adjacent premises, is hereby declared a nuisance; and whoever shall permit any such nuisance to be discharged, or to flow from or out of any premises owned or occupied by him or under his control into any street or alley or into any adjacent premises, after he has had due notice by the Town marshal or any person aggrieved thereby, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars for each and every offence.

Section 4. All cattle pens, hog pens, stock-lots, stock yards, chutes, and places used for receiving or loading or unloading, or quartering, or shipping any horses, mules, cattle, hogs, or sheep, which are detrimental and obnoxious to the health or comfort of persons residing in the neighborhood of the same, by reason of the filthy condition thereof, are hereby declared to be nuisances. Where the existence of any such nuisance shall in any manner come to the knowledge of the Town Board of Trustees, the subject shall at once be referred to the Town marshal who at once shall proceed to make examination of the supposed nuisance and make report in writing to the Board of Trustees of the condition thereof; and if the Board of Trustees shall be satisfied of the existence of a nuisance by reason of the existence of filthy they may pass an order requiring that such nuisance be at once abated by the removal of the filth then accumulated and by ceasing to

use the premises in such manner as to cause an accumulation of more filth; which order shall describe the said premises and the location thereof and shall name some things within which its provisions must be complied with.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after its due publication.

Relating to the collections of fines for violation of the ordinances of the Town of Stillwater.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Payne Co. OK. Territory.

When any person or persons shall have been arrested and fined for the violation of any ordinance of the Town of Stillwater, and shall have been committed to the Town jail in default of such fine and costs, it shall be the duty of the Town marshal to take such person and deliver him, with a copy of the judgement of the Council wherein such party was found guilty, with the amount of the fine and costs thereon, and deliver such person to the custody of the Street Commissioner, and he shall compel such person to labor on the streets and alleys or any other public works of the Town, for eight hours in each day, and shall credit him with one dollar for each day he shall so diligently labor, and shall discharge him when he shall have labored out his fine and costs.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after its due publication.

Ordinance No. 22

An ordinance to guard against and prevent fires within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Be it ordained by the president and Board of trustees of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory

Sec. 1 Any person or persons owning or [?] in any building at or within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater where the same is connected with [any] other building or within the distance of 100 feet from any building, such person or persons occupying or residing in such building shall build or cause to be built [buck] or double metallic flues to extend not less than three feet above the roof of such building.

Sec. 2 It shall be the duty of the town marshal to investigate and report to the [chamber] of the board of trustees the names of any and all persons who violate any of the [?] of this ordinance

Sec. 3 Any person or persons who shall violate any of the [foresaid] of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars.

An ordinance to license and regulate auction establishments and street peddlers

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the town of Stillwater.

Section 1 - Any person or persons who shall conduct any auction sale of goods, wares, or merchandise on the street or in any building within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater shall first pay into the Town Treasurer the sum of two dollars and fifty cents (\$2 50/100) for each and every day that such person or persons shall conduct such auction sales, after the payment of said sum of money into the Town Treasurer, the Clerk shall issue a license to such to such person to conduct such auction sale.

Section 2. Any person or persons who shall sell or exhibit for sale any good, ware, or merchandise upon the street of the town of Stillwater or any person or persons who shall engage in the business of peddling any goods wares or merchandise within the corporate limits of the Town of Stillwater shall first pay into the Town Treasurer the sum of two dollars and fifty cents \$2.50, for each and everyday that they may sell or exhibit for sale any such good, ware, or merchandise on the street, or engage in peddling any goods, wares, or merchandise within the corporate limits of the Town of Stillwater. After the payment of said sum of money, the Town Clerk shall issue a license to such person or persons granting the right of such persons to engage in peddling such goods, wares, or merchandise upon the streets and to such person to engage in peddling.

Section 3. Any person or persons who shall give any public exhibition upon the streets in any building within the corporate limits of the Town of Stillwater shall pay the sum of three dollars \$3.00 [*scratched out*: into the Town Treasurer] for each and every such exhibition after the payments of said sum into the Town Treasurer the Town

Clerk shall issue a license granting o such person the privilege to give such public exhibitions provided that nothing in this act shall be construed so as to [?] any school or church entertainment that may be given for the purpose of charity or for the benefit of any church or church person by the people of the Town of Stillwater.

Section 4 Any person or persons who shall violate any of the ordinances of section one two and three of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in sum not less than one nor more than ten dollars for each and every offense.

Section 5 This ordinance shall take effect from and after its due publication.

An ordinance relating to peace and quiet.

Sec. 1 - Whoever in the corporate limits of the Town of Stillwater shall make any loud or unusual noise calculated to disturb the peace and quiet of any person or persons' family, religious congregation or any other congregation of the people lawfully assembled or who shall discharge fire arms rockets [?] fireworks or any other combustible material in the streets, alleys, lots, grounds, or about in the vicinity of any building or who shall be guilty of ay assault and battery or using language calculated to provoke a [?] of the [?] shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one nor more than ten dollars for each offense.

Sec. 2. - This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its due publication and all ordinance or lack of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

An ordinance relating Liquor Dealers.

Fixing amount of license and penalty for violation of the same.

Sec. I Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the town of Stillwater O.T.

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, association, partnership, or corporation to engage in the business of selling intoxicating liquor at wholesale or retail within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory or within two miles of the boundary lines thereof, without first having made application and obtained a license therefor from the President and Board of Trustees of said Town of Stillwater.

Sec. II Any person or persons, association or partnership, or corporation, desiring to engage in the selling of intoxicating liquors, as provided for in Sec. one, shall present his application therefor to said President and Board of Trustees, stating the time, [?] desires to commence, and the lot and blocks in said Town, upon which he proposes to conduct said business. If upon the presentations of said application, as aforesaid, it shall appear satisfactory to the said President and Board of Trustees, that the applicant has complied with the law relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors at retail, as provided by the Act of the Territorial Assembly, passed and approved, December 24th A.D. 1890, then such applicant shall be permitted to sell intoxicating liquor in said town of Stillwater O.T. upon the payment to the town Treasurer the sum of \$475.00 Four Hundred and Seventy Five Dollars as hereinafter provided.

Sec. III The said sum of Four Hundred and Seventy Five Dollars shall be payable, semiannually, in advance, and said license shall run from the first of each month in which the same is issued, and upon the failure to pay any such, semi-annual instalment, within five days, after the same [?] due and payable, any license issued as aforesaid shall be revoked, provided that the license shall extend beyond the time for which the applicant has given Bond, and obtained license from the Board of County Commissioners, as provided by Act of the Territorial Assembly, referred to in Sec. One in this ordinance.

Sec. IV When any such semi-annual instalments shall be payed to the Town Treasurer, as aforesaid, said Treasurer shall deliver to the applicant a receipt therefor giving date, amount, and purpose for which it was paid, and upon presentation of such receipt the Town Clerk shall issue a license to the applicant. Said License shall be signed by the President of the Board of Trustees and attested by the Clerks, under the official seal of said Town. It shall state the date of said License, the name of the applicant, and the time for which the same is to run, and the lot and blocks upon which the business is to be carried on. No such License shall be transferrable, nor shall the place of business be changed, without the consent of the President and the Board of Trustees, given at a regular or special meeting.

Sec. V All money paid into the Treasury for Licenses as aforesaid shall become a general fund subject to the appropriation of any debt, obligation or liability of said town.

as may be determined by the President of the Board of Trustees, at any regular or special meeting.

Sec. VI Any person or persons, copartnership or corporation, who shall sell at wholesale or retail or give away, [*scratched out: [any]*] upon any pretext, malt, vinous, or spirituous liquor or any intoxicating drinks, without first having complied with the providence of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined, in the sum of not less than \$50.00 or more than \$100.00.

Sec. VII Every person licensed as provided by this ordinance who shall sell or give away any malt, vinous or spirituous liquor, or any intoxicating drinks to any minor, apprentice, or servant, under the age of twenty one years, shall forfeit and pay for each offense, the sum of Twenty Five Dollars.

Sec. VIII Any minor, apprentice, or servant, who shall for the purpose of evading the provisions of the preceding section falsely represent his age, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall upon conviction be fined in any sum, not less than Five nor more than Twenty Five Dollars.

Sec. IX Every person so licensed under the provisions of the ordinance, who shall sell or give, to any infirm, idiot, insane person, or habitual drunk any intoxicating liquor, shall forfeit and pay for each offense, the sum of Fifty Dollars.

Sec. X Every person who shall sell, or give, any intoxicating liquors on the day of any regular or special election, or any town election, or on Sunday who shall keep an open saloon after midnight, or open the same before five o'clock in the morning shall forfeit and pay the sum of One Hundred Dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. XI Every person licensed under the provisions of this ordinance who shall sell or give to any intoxicated person any intoxicating liquors, or who shall permit any loud and boisterous or unusual noise, or about his place of business, calculated to disturb the peace and quietude of the neighborhood, or shall keep an ill or disorderly house, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than Ten, nor more than Twenty Five Dollars and in addition thereto, the President and Board of Trustees may revoke the license of such offender and for the purpose, the said [?], the record of any court showing the connection of any persons for the violations of any of the provisions of this section, shall be deemed sufficient without further proof.

Sec. XII This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and once publication, all ordinances or parts of ordinance in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby replaced. Passed and approved this 13th day of Sept. 1892.

Ordinance No. 30

An ordinance to Fixing the salary of the members of the Board of Trustees.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater Oklahoma Territory.

Sec I The chairman and each member of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater who shall have served as a member of the Board of Trustees shall receive as a salary for such service the sum of Two \$2.00 dollars per month for each month that they may have served as such Trustees.

Sec II The chairman and each member of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, who shall hereafter serve as such Trustees, shall receive a salary of Two \$2.00 per month for each month that they shall so serve.

Sec III - This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and due publication.

Ordinance No. 3.

An ordinance to prevent stock from running at large.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec 1 - No person or persons shall be permitted to let any horse, mule, ass, cow, or swine, to run at large within the corporate limits of the town, and no person shall be permitted to picket any horse, cow, mule, or ass in any street or alley in [scratched out: the any sheet] the town, or picket there in such a manner as to allow them to stray in the street or alley, in such a manner as to obstruct or interfere with travel on the same.

Sec 2 - It shall be the duty of the town marshal to take up and impound, all stock found running at large, within the corporate limits of the town, and all stock found picketed in the streets or alleys, or any stock picketed, so as to allow them to stray into or obstruct any street or alley. The city marshal, shall take up all such stock, not found, and impound there in a safe and secure place, and feed and care for them. And no persons shall be allowed to take possession of such stock, until they shall have first paid to the city marshal, the sum of one \$1.00 Dollar per head, for each and every day that such stock shall have been impounded, the city marshal, shall pay all expenses for the feeding and care of such stock, and shall be allowed one half of the fees collected, as compensation for the same,

Sec 3. - Any person who shall take possession of any stock impounded without first paying the fees for impounding the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction be fined any sums, not less than one nor more than ten \$10.00 dollars.

Sec. 4 - This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

Ordinance No. [30 ½]

An ordinance relating to the building of sidewalks and collecting a special tax for the payment of the same.

Be it ordained by the president and the board of trustees of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. 1. – That whereas a petition signed by a majority of the property owners in the blocks hereafter mentioned asking that sidewalks be built on the streets hereinafter mentioned, which petitions have been presented to the president and board of Trustees of the town of Stillwater, and it being deemed by the president and board of Trustees that such sidewalks should be built, it is therefore ordered that sidewalks be build on the streets of Stillwater as follows: -

Commencing at the South-East corner of blocks 42 and Main Street running north along the east side of blocks forty-two (42), Thirty three (33.), Twenty eight (28) and Nineteen (19), then south on said street along the west side of blocks eighteen (18), twenty nine (29), thirty two (32), and forty three (43), and on Ninth Avenue running east along the north side of blocks forty two (42) and forty three (43), then west on said avenue along the side south of blocks thirty two (32) and thirty three (33) and on seventh avenue along the south side of blocks nineteen (19).

Sec. 2. - That the sidewalks to be built on Main Street shall be built of Pine boards two inches thick and laid upon five stringers 2 by 6. Oak or Pine lumber and said sidewalks on said street to be Twelve (12) feet wide, and the sidewalks on Ninth Avenue

To be ten (10) feet wide and of two inch Pine boards laid upon four (4) stringers 2 by 6 Oak or Pine lumber, and the sidewalks to be built on Seventh avenue to be built of Pine lumber one (1) inch thick and laid upon three (3) stringers 2 by 4 Oaks or Pine lumber and to be four (4) feet wide.

Sec. 3. - There shall be levied a special tax for the payment of said sidewalks and shall become a [lieu] upon the lots along which said sidewalks is built and the owner of said lots failing to pay for the building of said sidewalks within thirty days from the completion of the same there shall be added a penalty for ten percent and in addition thereto penalties provided for delinquent taxes.

Sec. 4. - When the special tax is levied it shall be the duty of the city marshal to calculate the amount of tax for any block, lot or piece of ground and pay it into city treasury, and file a statement thereof with the town clerks who shall assume that a tax is due on any block, lot or piece of ground, issue a certificate describing its number and lot and blocks, and stating the amount of tax due thereon, and the name of the persons entitled to the same, and the purpose for which said tax was levied, and such certificate so given shall be the tax warrant of the collection and shall be by the clerks placed in the hands of the city marshal and he shall keep a record of all such warrants and enter on the margin

of such records all amounts paid and by whom paid, it shall be the duty of the city marshal to notify the owner or owners of any lot or lots along which said sidewalks has been built. The amount that is due for the building of said side-walks when the same is completed.

Sec. 5. - This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and due publication.

An ordinance to prevent and punish fast driving or riding on the streets or alleys of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. 1 Whoever shall be guilty of horse racing fast riding or driving on any street or alley or within the corporal limits of the Town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall pay a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than two dollars.

Sec. 2 This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its due passage and publication.

Ordinance No. 23

An ordinance to license and regulate drays

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. 1 Any person or persons who shall hereafter run and operate within the corporate limits of the Town of Stillwater O. T. any dray wagon for the purpose of delivering goods from one part of the Town to another for hire and profit shall first pay into the town treasury the sum of \$8 for every year that he may run and operate such dray wagon. After the payment of such sum of money into the town treasury, the town clerk shall issue a license to such person permitting such person to run and operate such dray wagon.

Sec. 2 Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of the provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be find in any sum not less than one nor more than two dollars that he or they shall run or operate such dray wagon without first obtaining such license.

Sec. 3 This ordinance shall take effect from and after its due publication.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. I Any person or persons who shall leave standing on the street or alley within the corporate limits of the Town of Stillwater any horse or team hitched to any vehicle without hitching them shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum of not less than one nor more than ten dollars.

Sec. II This ordinance shall take effect [*crossed out*: [and be in]] from and after its due publication.

Ordinance No. 34

An ordinance relating to gambling, providing penalties therefor.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. I It shall be unlawful for any person within the [*crossed out*: [town of]] corporate limits of the Town of Stillwater to maintain or keep any tables or cards or any other [*crossed out*: [device]] articles or apparatuses whatever or intended to be used in playing any game of cards or faro or other games of chance upon which money is usually wagered.

Sec. II Every person within the corporate limits of the Town of Stillwater who for gambling purpose keeps or exhibits any gambling tables, establishments, device or apparatus or is guilty of dealing faro or banking for others to deal faro or acting as lookout or gamekeeper for the game of faro or any other banking game where money or property is dependent upon the result is hereby declared a common gambler and guilty of a misdemeanor.

Sec. III Any person violating section I and II of this ordinance shall be fined the sum of ten dollars.

Sec. IV This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its due passage and publication.

An ordinance relating to the prevention and punishment for carrying concealed weapons.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Payne Co., Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. I That it shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater to carry concealed about his or her person any pistol, revolver, dirk, dagger, bowie knife, sling shot, or any dangerous or deadly missile or weapons.

Sec. II Any person guilty of violating section one of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one nor more than two dollars.

Sec. III This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and due publication.

Ordinance No. 35

An ordinance relating to the duty of Town Marshal and [? and ?] of the office.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater.

Sec. I Whenever the Town Marshal shall be elected or appointed as the case may be, he shall within the next five days after such appointment or election file with the town Clerk a good and sufficient fund in the sum of two hundred dollars to be approved by President and Board of Trustees conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of such office as fixed by the statues and ordinances.

Sec. II It shall be the duty of the Town Marshal to suppress all riots, disturbances and breaches of peace and to apprehend all rioters, disorderly persons, and other disturbers of the public peace of the Town. If such arrests be made in the day time of any week day, the offender shall forthwith be taken before a justice of the peace for examination. If such arrest be made in the night time or on Sunday, then the Marshall shall take sufficient security or pledge for the appearance of the offender before a justice of the peace at ten o'clock a.m. next week day and in case the offender cannot give bond or pledge, then he shall be confine din the town jail until the time fixed in this ordinance for his appearance before said justice.

Sec. III When the Marshall shall have knowledge of the violation of any ordinances or when information shall be given him by any officer of the town concerning the violation of any ordinances, it shall be his duty forthwith to arrest the offender and bring him before the justice to be dealt with according to law.

Sec. IV In case of resistance, the marshal his deputy or and may call to his assistance any bystander or other person in the vicinity. Any person refusing

when called upon for assistance as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Sec. V The Marshal shall upon the request of the President of the Board of Trustees make all necessary inquiries and examination under the ordinance relating to fines and see that said ordinance is [?] and report all violations of the same. For this purpose he shall be allowed access to all buildings by the owner or occupants thereof. If any person shall refuse admission to the Marshal as aforesaid, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Sec. VI The said Marshal shall be paid a salary of \$25 per month, payable monthly, and shall be allowed to collect such fees as is or may be provided by law for sheriffs and constables in similar cases provided that said town of Stillwater shall not be held responsible to said Marshal for any such fees uncollected by said Marshal.

Sec. VII This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from after its passage and due publication.

Ordinance No. 36

An ordinance relating to dogs and imposing a tax thereon.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater.

Sec. I That any person owning keeping or harboring any dog within the limits of the Town of Stillwater shall pay a tax of one dollar on each male and two dollars on each female dog which shall entitle such a person to keep such a dog one year.

Sec. II That any person wishing to license a dog shall first pay to the town clerk the sum required in section one. The Clerk shall then issue to the applicant a certificate containing a description of the dog licensed and stating that the person therein named has paid the required tax and is entitled and allowed to keep the dog described therein one year from the date thereof. The Clerk shall enter upon a book kept for that purpose a record of such license the name of the person licensing the same and description and name of the dog if he or she has one.

Sec. III That the Clerk, on issuing a certificate shall also deliver to the party to whom the certificate is issued a metal tag bearing the letters ["J. R."] which tag shall be attached with a metallic fastening to a collar at least three fourths of an inch wide to be kept constantly upon the neck of the dog licensed. When the Clerk is satisfied that any [?] is lost, he shall issue another check upon the payment of twenty-five cents.

Sec. IV That it shall be the duty of the Town Marshall to take up and impound in a suitable place to be provided by the Marshal at the expense of the Town all dogs upon which the usual tax has not been paid or which are found roaming at large without collar or check as provided in this ordinance or, when such dog cannot be safely impounded to kill same without delay.

Sec. V The President of the Board of Trustees or Mayor or as

The case may be shall deem is necessary, he is hereby empowered to order the muzzling of all dogs roaming at large within the limits of said town in such a manner that it shall be impossible for such dog to [?] or [?] any person or animal and it shall be the duty of the Marshal to impound any unmuzzled dog found roaming at large while such proclamation remains in force.

Sec. VI That it shall be the duty of the Town Marshal to kill any female dog when in heat and found roaming at large.

Sec. VII That no license or tag shall protect any dangerous dog [?] shall [?] or endanger any person within the town.

Sec. VIII That any dog impounded under the provisions of section 4 and 5 of this ordinance may be released upon the application of the owner thereof within forty eight hours upon presentation of a certificate that [???] tax has been paid or placing upon such dog a muzzle or check as may be required and pay [?] of Marshal for impounding said dog. [?] dog impounded and not released as above shall be killed and buried at the expense of the town.

Sec. IX That the Marshal shall be allowed the sum of 75 cts. For each dog killed and buried at the expense of the town, to be paid out by the town treasury from any fund not otherwise appropriated.

Sec X That any person who shall keep or harbor an unlicensed dog or who shall let an unlicensed dog roam at large without a muzzle during the time in which the President of the Board of Trustees shall order the muzzling of all dogs shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars.

Sec Xi This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and due publication.

An ordinance relating to the obstruction of streets and sidewalks.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Payne County, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. I That any person who shall unnecessarily obstruct any street, alley, sidewalk, or crossing or other public place within the Town of Stillwater with any vehicle, box, lumber, stone, buck, implement, or other thing or who shall place any dirt or rubbish in any street or alley or other public place or who shall dig any hole or excavation in any street, alley, or public place or who shall fail to remove any such obstruction or fill up such hole or excavation when ordered to do it by the Town Marshal shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not to exceed ten dollars and each day that such obstruction shall remain after such order shall constitute a separate offense.

Sec. II That any person who shall ride or drive any horse or other animal upon any sidewalk or who shall hitch any animal so that it gets upon any sidewalk in said town shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Sec. III That any person who shall sweep or thrown or cause to be swept any paper, dirt, trash, or rubbish in the street, public ground, or alley of said town, or who shall [?] or throw from any wagon or other vehicle any hay or straw, filth or rubbish of any kind in any street, alley, or public ground of said town shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Sec. IV This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and due publication.

An ordinance to regulate and prevent the keeping of gasoline and kerosene and powder and dynamite in the town of Stillwater.

Be it ordained by the president and board of trustees of the town of Stillwater.

Sec. 1 - Any person or persons engaged in the mercantile business shall not be permitted to keep any kerosene or gasoline in the building in which mercantile business is carried on; but must keep such kerosene and gasoline in a safe and secure building separate and apart from the one in which such mercantile business is carried on.

Any person or persons in violating of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00)

Sec. 2 - Any person or persons engaged in the mercantile business in the town of Stillwater shall not be permitted to keep for sale more than fifty pounds of gun powder within the building in which such mercantile business is conducted and the same to be kept in a closed tin can or cans and to be handled or sold by daylight only. All gun powder in excess of this amount including dynamite and gun power must be kept in a safe and secure building (erected for this exclusive purpose) out of and beyond the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater.

Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00).

Sec. 3 - This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and due publication.

Ordinance No. 41

An ordinance to license and regulate auction establishments and street peddlers.

Be it ordained by the president and board of trustees of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. 1 - Any person or persons who shall conduct any auction sale of goods or any bankrupt stock of such goods wares or merchandise upon the street or shall sell or exhibit for sale any bankrupt stock of goods wares or merchandise within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater shall pay unto the town treasurer the sum of ten dollars for each and every day that such person or persons so conduct such auction sale.

After the payment of said sum of money into the town treasury, the town clerk shall sign a license to such person or persons, granting the right to conduct such auction sale.

Sec. 2 - Any person or persons who shall sell or exhibit for sale any goods wares or merchandise or any bankrupt stock of such goods wares or merchandise upon the streets of the town of Stillwater or person or persons who shall engage in business or peddling, any goods, wares or merchandise within the corporal limits of the town of Stillwater shall first pay unto the town treasurer the sum of ten dollars for each and every day that they may sell or exhibit for sale any such goods wares or merchandise or any bankrupt stock of goods, wares or merchandise upon the streets of the town of Stillwater or engaged in peddling any goods wares or merchandise or any bankrupt stock of such goods wares or merchandise, within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater. After the payment of said sum of money unto the town treasurer, the town clerk shall sign a license to such person or persons to engage in the selling of such goods wares or merchandise or bankrupt stock of such

goods, wares, or merchandise upon the streets, and to such person engaged in peddling.

Sec. 3 Any person or persons who shall give any public exhibition upon the streets or in any building within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater shall pay or cause to be paid the sum of three dollars, except it be a circus or menagerie, which shall pay \$15 for each and every such exhibition. After the payment of such sum of money into the town treasury, the town clerk shall issue a license granting to such person or persons the privilege of giving such public exhibition, : Provided: That nothing in this section shall be construed so as to affect any school or church entertainment that may be given for the purpose of charity or for the benefit of any church or school purpose by the people of the town of Stillwater.

Sec 4. Any person or persons who shall violate the provisions of sections one (1) two (2) and three (3) of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00) for each and every offense.

Sec. 5 All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval and due publication.

Ordinance No. 42

An ordinance granting a franchise to the Western Union Telephone Company to use the streets and alleys of the Town of Stillwater, O. T., for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, and operating a telephone exchange system therein.

Be it enacted by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater.

Sec. 1 That the Western Union Telephone Company of Perry, Oklahoma Territory, their heirs, administrators, successors and assigns are hereby granted a franchise, and by these presents are authorized, empowered, and permitted to erect, maintain and operate a Telephone Exchange System over and through the streets and alleys of the Town of Stillwater, as the same now are, or may hereafter be extended.

Sec. 2 That this franchise and privilege herein granted shall continue in force and operation for a term of twenty-one years from the date of its passage and approval by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. 3 That all poles used in the construction of the said Telephone Exchange System by the said Western Union telephone Company shall at all times conform to the grades established by said town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. 4 That the poles used for the construction of the said Telephone Exchange System shall in no wise interfere with the sidewalk or obstruct in any manner the travel over and through the streets and alleys of said town.

Sec. 5 That the poles and wires used in the construction of said Telephone Exchange System shall during the existence of the franchise herein granted be kept and maintained in good repair.

Sec. 6 That all the materials used in the construction of the said Telephone Exchanged System shall be of the best grade obtainable and the box appliances and instruments used in the transmission of messages shall be of the most modern and improved invention.

Sec. 7 That said Western Union Telephone Company shall within thirty (30) days from and after the passage of this ordinance commence the construction of a telephone line which, when completed, shall connect the town of Stillwater with the town of Perry in County "P", of Oklahoma Territory, [*illegible*] some other station on the [*illegible*] Topeka and Santa Fe railway and the said line shall eb completed and opened for public use and the transmission of the telephone messages within ninety (90) days from and after the passage of this ordinance. In case the said Western Union Telephone Company shall fail to so commence or complete said telephone lien within the times herein named, their franchise herein granted shall be forfeited and revert to the said town of Stillwater.

Sec. 8 That said Western Union Telephone Company shall establish and at all times maintain an office to be open for the receiving and transmission of messages and shall transfer and forward by telegraph or telephone all messages to their destination when destination cannot be reached by said

Western Union Telephone Company line, and said office shall be opened from 7 o'clock a.m. until 8 o'clock, p.m., in or convenient to the business portion of said town of Stillwater and shall at the terminal point of said line provided for in section seven (7) of this ordinance also maintain an office open for the receipt and transmission of messages during the same time.

Sec. 9 That this ordinance shall be in force and operation after its passage and publication in the Oklahoma State Sentinel according to law.

An ordinance Relating to Auctioneers

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the town of Stillwater.

Section 1 - Any person or persons who shall conduct any auction sale of any personal property within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, O.T., shall first pay into the town treasury the sum of twenty dollars (\$20.00) per annum. Upon the payment of said sum of money into the town treasury, the town clerk shall give license to such persons to conduct such auction sale. License may be issued under their section for the fractional part of a year, but no license shall be issued for a period of less than three months, to begin on the first day of January, April, July, and October. Respectfully for which the party applying shall pay into the treasury the sum of five dollars (\$5.00). Five dollars before said license is issued.

Sec. 2 - No persons conducting any auction sale under this ordinance shall be allowed to conduct such sale on main street in the said town of Stillwater.

Sec. 3 - Any person or persons violating any one of the proceeding sections of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined in the sum of twenty dollars (\$20.00).

Ordinance No. 45

An ordinance relating to poll tax

Be it ordained by the Chairman and board of trustees of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Sec. 1 - All male persons between the age of twenty one and twenty five who have resided thirty days in the said town of Stillwater who are capable of performing labor on the public street and who are not a county or city charge shall be liable each year to perform four day sat street work at eight hours each on the public streets of said town of Stillwater under the directions of the Street Commissioner of said town, or furnish a substitute to do the same, or pay the sum of one dollar per day to said Street Commissioner who shall give receipt for the same, provided that one dollar per day shall be allowed for a [?] when [used] at the discretion of the Street Commissioner.

Sec. 2 - The street commissioner shall give legal notice to persons residing in said town of Stillwater liable to or charged with a poll tax, at the time and place he will attend and direct the work to be performed as aforesaid, the street commissioner may direct what implements such person shall bring with which to perform such work.

Sec. 3 - In case any person shall neglect or refuse to do the four days of work, furnish a substitute, or pay the one dollar per day as provided in section one of this ordinance, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in the sum of five dollars for each refusal to work. If any person shall appear at the proper time and place as decreed by

the street commissioner, and neglect or refuse to do a reasonable day's work according to his ability, he shall be liable the same as if he neglected or refused to appear or furnish a substitute, or pay that said sum of money mentioned in section one of this ordinance.

An Ordinance Providing for Protection against Fires Within the Corporate Limits of the Town of Stillwater, O. T.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF STILLWATER,
O. T.

Sec. 1. Any person or persons owning or residing in any building within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, where the same is connected with, or within one hundred feet of, any other building, such person or persons so owning or residing in such building shall cause to be built in a safe and fire-proof manner, brick or double

metallic flues, to extend not less than three feet above the roof of such building.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the town marshal to investigate all buildings situated within the limits fixed by section one of this ordinance, and in case he shall find that the provisions of section one, are being violated by the owner or occupant of any building, or that stoves, flues or pipes therein are unsafe by reason of being defective or not sufficiently protected from the woodwork or inflammable contest of said building, he shall immediately notify said owner or occupant in writing, specifying the defects to be remedied or protection against fire to be supplied. Such owner or occupant shall within twenty-four hours, after the receipt of said notice, remedy such defects or provide such protection substantially as required in said notice or discontinue the fire in all such defective stoves, pipes or flues until the same are so remedied and protected.

Sec. 3. The notice provided for in the foregoing section may be served by delivering a copy thereof to the owner or occupant of said building or to any member of the household residing therein and over the age of fourteen years, and the town marshal shall receive as fees for such service the sum of twenty-five cents, such sum to be paid out of the Treasury of said town, upon the filing with the Clerk of said town of the original of said notice, with the marshal's return thereon, showing whether the requirements of said notice have or have not been complied with within twenty-four hours after the service of the same.

Sec. 4. It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of said town to deposit ashes or cinders within one hundred feet of any building, barn, shed, stable, pen or out-building or hay, straw or other inflammable materials, or to place or deposit said ashes or cinders in any wooden or inflammable box or receptacle within such limit, unless said ashes or cinders are free from all fire or sparks, or live or ardent coals, and have in addition thereto been kept for a period of not less than forty-eight hours in an iron or other fire-proof receptacle.

Sec. 5. All oil or gasoline stoves or ranges in use in any hotel, restaurant, eating house or lunch room, within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, shall be under the inspection of the town marshal, and in case any such stove or range shall be by him deemed unsafe, he shall notify the owner, or some person in charge or control of such hotel, restaurant, eating-house or lunch room to said effect, and it shall be unlawful thereafter for any person to use such stove or range, or to light, fire or heat the same, until the same is made safe and secure against danger of fire therefrom.

Sec. 6. It shall be lawful for the town marshal to enter any dwelling or other building situated within the limit named in section one of this ordinance, or any room or compartment therein, at any reasonable hour of the day time, for the purpose of inspecting the chimneys, flues, pipes, stoves, ranges or furnaces in such dwelling or other building.

Sec. 7. Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall on conviction thereof, be fined not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars.

An Ordinance to Regulate and Permit the Keeping of Gasoline, Kerosene, Gun Powder, Giant Powder and Dynamite, in the Town of Stillwater, O. T.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF STILLWATER, O. T.

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons engaged in the mercantile, or any other business, in the town of Stillwater, to keep any Kerosene or Gasoline in the building in which such mercantile or other business is carried on, but all such persons shall keep such Kerosene or Gasoline in a safe and secure building separate and apart from the one in which such mercantile or other business is carried on.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons engaged in the mercantile business, in the town of Stillwater, to keep for sale more than fifty pounds of Gun Powder, Giant Powder or Dynamite within the building in which such mercantile or other business is conducted, and the same to be kept in a closed tin can, and to be handled or sold in day time only. All Gun Powder, Giant Powder or Dynamite in excess of fifty pounds must be kept in a safe and secure building (erected for this exclusive purpose) out of and beyond the corporate limits of the said town of Stillwater at least one-fourth mile. Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined the sum of ten dollars.

Ordinance No. 5.

An Ordinance Relating to Nuisances and the Abatement Thereof.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF STILLWATER, O. T.

Sec. 1. Any premises or any part thereof which may be nauseous or offensive to any person, or family residing near the same, or to persons passing along the street or alley near the same, or which may be in such condition as to be detrimental to public health of comfort, within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, shall be deemed a nuisance.

Sec. 2. The doing of any unlawful act, or the omitting to perform a duty which act or omission either annoys, injures or endangers the comfort, exposes the health, or safety of others, or offends public decency, or in any way renders other persons insecure in life, or the use of property within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater shall be deemed a nuisance.

Sec. 3. The keeping of any swine within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, at any time between the first day of April and the first day of November of each year shall be deemed a nuisance.

Sec. 4. The discharging, placing, throwing or allowing the discharging or flowing from adjacent premises into any street or alley of the corporate town of Stillwater, or upon any adjoining premises, of any nauseous, foul, offensive or putrid liquid or substance or any liquid or substance likely to become nauseous, foul, offensive or putrid, shall be deemed a nuisance, and whoever shall permit such nuisance to be discharged or to flow from or out of any premises owned or occupied by him, or under his control, into any street or alley or onto adjacent premises, shall be deemed guilty of committing a nuisance.

Sec. 4. All cattle pens, hog pens, stock lots, stock yards, shuts and *[illegible]* for receiving, loading or unloading, or quartering *[illegible]* horses, mules, cattle, hogs, or other *[illegible]* the filthy conditions thereof *[illegible]* or comfort of persons residing in the *[illegible]* shall be deemed a nuisance.

Sec. 5. All *[illegible]* of the carcass of a dead animal *[illegible]* twenty-four hours after death, *[illegible]* corporate limits of the town of Stillwater *[illegible]* therefrom, and there *[illegible]* the level surface of the earth *[illegible]* of any such dead animal *[illegible]*, dead animal or animals, shall *[illegible]* same to remain unburied within *[illegible]* the town of Stillwater, for any period *[illegible]* four hours after death, or if the owner *[illegible]* premises within the said corporate limits, on *[illegible]* said dead animal or animals may be found shall, after notice, neglect to so remove and bury the same, the person, or persons, so offending shall be deemed guilty of a nuisance.

Sec. 6. Every successive owner or occupant of property, who neglects to abate a continuing nuisance upon, or in the use of such property, created by a former owner or occupant, is liable therefor in the same manner as the one who first created it.

Sec. 7. No slaughter house, pen or place where animals are slaughtered, shall be maintained within one-half mile of the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, and any person or persons, partnership or corporation violating the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a nuisance.

Sec. 8. No person shall allow any stallion, jack or bull to serve, or try, or tease for the purpose of serving, any female of their kind of species, within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, except within a barn or building, or enclosure sufficient in height and construction to screen such service, or trying or teasing for service, from public view, and sufficiently remote from the streets of said town, so that the same shall not be offensive to public decency. The owner or keeper of any such stallion, jack or bull, and the owner or occupant of any lot or premises whereon such service, or trying and teasing for service may be made, in violation of the provisions of this section, shall be guilty of a nuisance.

~~Sec. 9.~~ Any person or persons, who shall be convicted of the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall for each offence, be fined not less than one nor more than ten dollars.

Sec. 10. It shall be the duty of the town marshal of Stillwater to at all times strictly enforce this ordinance, and when he shall have notice, or knowledge of the existence of any nuisance within the corporate limits of said town, he shall at once proceed to make examination of such nuisance, or alleged nuisance, and if he shall find a nuisance to exist, he shall at once notify the owner or occupant of the premises whereon the same exists, or originates, or the owner or person in charge of the substance, material or matter constituting such nuisance, requiring such person or persons to remove or abate the same, as required by this ordinance, within twenty-four hours after such notice, and shall also forthwith report the existence of said nuisance to the President of the Board of Trustees, who shall call a special meeting of said board and if they be satisfied that the nuisance exist, and that the requirements of the marshal's notice have not been complied with, they may pass an order requiring that such nuisance be at once abated by the removal thereof, or such other means as they may deem efficient and reasonable, which order shall describe the premises upon which such nuisance is located, and shall name a limit within which its provisions must be complied with. The town marshal shall execute all such orders made by the Board of Trustees under this section, and shall be entitled to compensation for his reasonable expenditures in the enforcement thereof.

An Ordinance to Prevent the Keeping of Gambling Houses, and Providing Penalties Therefor.

An Ordinance Relating to Liquor Dealers, Fixing the Amount of License, and Penalty for Violating of the Law

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF STILLWATER, O. T.

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, association, firm, co-partnership or corporation to engage in the business of selling intoxicating liquors wholesale or retail within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, Okla. Ter., or within two miles of the boundary limits thereof, without first having made application and obtained a license therefor from the President and Board of Trustees of said town of Stillwater.

Sec. 2. Any person or persons, firm, co-partnership, or corporation desiring to engage in the business of selling intoxicating liquors at retail within the town of Stillwater within two miles of the corporate limits thereof, must first present his or their application for a license to the President and Board of Trustees of said town, which application shall state the time when he or they desire to commence said business and the lot and block in said town on which it is proposed to conduct such business. Such license shall not be issued for a period greater than one year nor less than six months and shall in all cases be at the rate of five hundred dollars per annum, payable semi-annually in advance. If upon the presentation of the application as aforesaid it shall satisfactorily appear to said President of the Board of Trustees that said applicant has complied with the provisions of Chapter 47 of the statutes of Oklahoma, as amended by the act of the Territorial Assembly, passed and approved March 9th, 1893, then upon payment by said applicant to the treasurer of said town of the amount of said semi-annual installment, and the presentation of the treasurer's receipt therefor to the clerk of said town, said clerk shall issue to said applicant a license, under the corporate seal of said town, permitting said applicant to sell intoxicating liquors at retail within the corporate limits of said town, upon the premises described in said application. Said license shall run from the first day of the month in which the same is issued, and upon the failure to pay any semi-annual installment within five days after the same becomes due and payable such license shall stand revoked and cancelled.

Sec. 3. The license provided for herein shall be signed by the President and Board of Trustees of the town of Stillwater, and attested by the clerk under the seal of said town; it shall state the date of said license, the name of the applicant, the time which the same is to run and the lot and block upon which the business is to be conducted. Such license shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the building in which said business is carried on. No such license shall be transferable, nor shall the place of business be changed without the consent of the President and Board of Trustees of said town given at a regular or special meeting.

Sec. 4. Any person, persons, firm, co-partnership or corporation desiring to engage in the business of wholesaling intoxicating liquors in the town of Stillwater, or within two miles of the corporate limits thereof, shall first present to the President and Board of Trustees of said town an application for a wholesale license as provided in section two of this ordinance. Such license shall not be issued for a period greater than one year, nor for less than six months, and shall in all cases terminate with the license issued by the Board of County Commissioners of Payne County to the applicant and shall be at the rate of thirty dollars payable semi-annually in advance. If upon the presentation of the application as aforesaid it shall satisfactorily appear to the President and Board of Trustees that said applicant has complied with the provisions of Chapter 47 of the statutes of Oklahoma, as amended by the act of the Territorial Assembly passed and approved March 9th, 1893, then upon payment by said application to the Treasurer of said town of the amount of said semi-annual installment and the presentation of the said Treasurer's receipt [*illegible*] to the Clerk of said town said Clerk shall issue to the applicant a license, under the corporate seal of said town permitting said applicant to sell intoxicating liquors [*illegible*] within the corporate limits or within two miles [*illegible*] of said town, upon the premises described in said application. Said license shall run from the fifth day of the month in which the same is issued and upon the failure to pay any semi-annual installment within five days after the same becomes due and payable such license shall stand revoked and cancelled.

Sec. 5. All money paid into the treasury for licenses as aforesaid shall become a general fund, subject to the appropriation and payment of any debt, obligation or liability of said town, as may be determined by the President and Board of Trustees of said town, at any regular or special meeting thereof.

Sec. 6. Any person or persons, firm, co-partnership or corporation who shall at wholesale or retail, sell or give away, upon any pretext, any malt, vinous, or spirituous liquors, or any intoxicating drinks within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, O. T., or within two miles of the boundaries thereof, without first having complied with the provisions of this ordinance, or who shall conduct such business without having such license posted as herein provided shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not less than ten dollars except in cases where the license amounts to more than that sum, then in that case in a sum not less than the equivalent of the license.

Sec. 7. Every person licensed as provided by this ordinance who shall sell or give away any malt, vinous or spirituous liquors, or any intoxicating drinks to any minor, apprentice or servant under the age of twenty-one years, within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, or within two miles thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and when convicted thereof, fined in the sum of ten dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 8. Every person so licensed under the provisions of this ordinance, who shall sell or give away to any infirm, idiot, insane person or habitual drunkard, any intoxicating liquor (prohibited by this ordinance) within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, O. T., or within two miles thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in the sum of ten dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 9. Every person licensed under the provisions of this ordinance who shall sell or give away any intoxicating liquors on the day of any regular or special election, or any town election, or on Sunday, or who shall

keep an open saloon after midnight, or open the same before five o'clock in the morning within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater, O. T., shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in the sum of ten dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 10. Every person under the provisions of this ordinance who shall sell or give to any intoxicated person any intoxicating liquor or who shall permit any loud or boisterous or unusual in or about his place of business calculated to disturb the peace and quietude of the neighborhood, or shall keep an ill or disorderly house within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars, and in addition thereto the President and Board of Trustees of said town may revoke the license of such offender, and for the purpose of said violation the record of any court showing the conviction of such person for the violation of any of the provisions of this section shall be sufficient without further proof.

An Ordinance Relating to Dogs and Imposing a Tax Thereon

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF STILLWATER, O.T.

Sec. 1. That every person owning, keeping or harboring any dog within the limits of the town of Stillwater shall pay an annual tax of one dollar on each male and two dollars on each female dog, which shall entitle such person to keep such dog one year.

Sec. 2. That every person wishing to license a dog shall first pay to the town Clerk the sum required in section one of this ordinance. The Clerk shall then issue to the applicant a certificate containing a description of the dog licensed and stating that the person therein named has paid the required tax and is allowed and entitled to keep the dog described therein one year from the date thereof. The Clerk shall enter upon a book, kept for that purpose, a record of such license, the name of the person procuring the same and description and name of the dog if he or she have one.

Sec. 3. The Clerk on issuing the certificate shall also deliver to the party to whom the certificate is issued a metal tag bearing the letters "T. P." which tag shall be attached with a metallic fastening to a collar at least three-fourths of an inch wide, to be kept constantly upon the neck of the dog licensed. When the Clerk is satisfied that any check is lost he shall issued another tag upon the payment of twenty-five cents.

Sec. 4. That it shall be the duty of the town marshal to take up and impound in a suitable place to be provided by the marshal at the expense of the town, all dogs upon which the annual tax has not been paid, or which are found running at large without collar or check as provided in this ordinance, or, when such dog cannot be safely impounded, to kill the same without delay.

Sec. 5. If the President of the Board of Trustees, shall deem it necessary he is hereby empowered to order the muzzling of all dogs running at large within the limits of said town in such a manner that it shall be impossible for such dogs to bite or injure any person or animal, and it shall be the duty of the marshal to impound any unmuzzled dogs found running at large while such proclamation remains in force.

Sec. 6. That it shall be the duty of the town marshal to impound or kill any female dog while in heat, if found running at large.

Sec. 7. That no license or tag shall protect any dangerous dog which shall annoy or endanger any person within the town.

Sec. 8. That any dog impounded under the provisions of sections four and five of this ordinance, may be released upon the application of the owner thereof, if made within forty-eight hours after impounding, upon the presentation of a certificate that the annual tax has been paid, or the placing on such dog of a muzzle or check as required and the payment of the marshal's fees for the impounding of such dog. Any dog impounded and not released as above, shall be killed and buried at the expense of the town.

Sec. 9. That the marshal shall be allowed the sum of seventy-five cents for each dog by him killed and buried under the provisions of this ordinance, to be paid out of the town treasury from any fund not otherwise appropriated.

An Ordinance Relating to the Duty of the Town Marshal

BE IT ORAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF STILLWATER, O.T.

Whenever a town marshal shall be elected or appointed as the case may be, he shall within the next five days after such election or appointment file with the town Clerk a good and sufficient bond in the sum of two hundred dollars to be approved by the President and Board of Trustees, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of such office as fixed by statue and ordinance.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the marshal to suppress all riots, disturbances and breaches of the peace and to apprehend all rioters, disorderly persons and other disturbers of the public peace of said town. If such arrest be made in the day time of any week day, the offender shall forthwith be taken before a Justice of the Peace for examination. If such arrest be made in the night time or on Sunday, then the marshal shall take sufficient security or pledge for the appearance of the offender before the Justice of the Peace at ten o'clock A. M., of the next week day, then he shall be confined in the town jail until the time fixed in this ordinance for his appearance before the said Justice.

Sec. 3. When the marshal shall have knowledge of the violation of any ordinance, or when information shall be given him by any officer of the town concerning the violation of any ordinance it shall be his duty forthwith to arrest the offender and bring him before the Justice to be dealt with according to law.

Sec. 4. In case of resistance, the marshal, his deputy or aid, may call to his assistance any bystander or other person in the vicinity. Any person refusing when called upon for assistance as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

That any person who shall place any camp, tent, or stand, or drive any wagon, or teams, or stock upon or through said park, or any other park or parks of said town to be hereafter established, or shall deface, destroy or damage any trees, shrubs or vines thereon, or pick, pull or carry away any flowers or other plants therefrom, or shall in any manner deface, destroy or damage any fences, buildings, seats, stands or other structures thereon, or dig up or destroy any grass thereon, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars.

An Ordinance Relating to Poll Tax.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTES OF THE TOWN OF STILLWATER, O.T.

Sec. 1. All male persons between the age of twenty-one and forty-five years, who have resided thirty days in the said town of Stillwater and who are capable of performing labor on the streets, and who are not a country or city charge, shall be liable each year to perform four days of street work of eight hours each on the public streets of said town of Stillwater under the direction of the street commissioner, or furnish a substitute to do the same, and in default of the work herein specified to pay the sum of one dollar per day to the street commissioner of said town, who shall give a receipt for the same; Provided, that one dollar per day shall be allowed for a team when used at the discretion of the street commissioner.

Sec. 2. The street commissioner shall give legal notice to persons residing in said town of Stillwater liable to be charged with poll tax, of the time and place he will attend and direct the work to be performed, as aforesaid, and the street commissioner may direct what implements such person shall bring with which to perform such work.

Sec. 3. In case any person shall neglect or refuse to do the four days of work or furnish a substitute or pay the one dollar per day as provided in section one of this ordinance eh shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in the sum of five dollars for each refusal to so work. If any person shall appear at the proper time and place as directed by the street commissioner, and neglect tor refuse to do a reasonable day's work according to his ability, he shall be liable the same as if he neglected or refused to appear, or furnish a substitute, or pay the said sum of money mentioned in section one of this ordinance.

Ordinance No. 29

An ordinance providing for the organization of fire companies and regulating the duties thereof, in the town of Stillwater, O. T.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, O. T.

Sec. 1 Sec. one. The fire department of the Town of Stillwater shall consist of the Town Trustees and such other fire wardens as may from time to time be appointed in accordance with the statues of this territory, and the [?] officers and wardens of the various fire companies, now organized, or which may from time to time be organized.

Sec. 2 Sec. two. The town trustees shall appoint one of the five wardens chief, and he shall be designated as chief of the five departments, and shall have general supervision, subject however, to the town trustees, of all apparatus for the extinguishment of fires, the organization and government of fire companies, and in each office he shall be this highest commanding officer.

Sec. 3 Sec. three. Each fire company now organized or hereafter organized shall elects its own officers, who shall be subject to the commands and orders of the chief of the fire department.

Sec. 4. Sec. four. The [?] fire companies now organized or hereafter organized shall adopt a uniform alarm for fire.

Sec. 5. Sec. five. Upon an alarm for fire, the different fire companies, under the command of their proper officers, shall repair with all possible speed to the place of the fire, with their fire apparatus, and there work and manage the same under the direction of the officer in command, or in his absence, place and manage the same by direction of their own officers, in the most effective manner until the fire is completely extinguished.

Sec. 6 Sec. six. If deemed advisable to prevent the spreading of the flames, any [wooding] building may be torn down and pulled out of the way; provided that at least three of these fire wardens shall be present at the time and concur in the practicality of tearing down and pulling out of the way such building.

Sec. 7 Sec. seven. If during a fire the highest commanding officer present shall deem it necessary, he shall have the right to summon any inhabitant of the town to assist in the extinguishment of the flames, and he shall also have the right to order all idle or suspicious persons, or persons not usefully employed, out of the way from the vicinity of the fire. If any person after being so summoned shall neglect or refuse to obey, or if any person after being ordered away from the vicinity of the fire shall refuse to leave, they shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than two or more than [ten] dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 8 Sec. eight. Any of the fire wardens shall have the right to visit and examine at all reasonable hours, dwelling houses, and buildings of every description, to discover if there is danger of fire therefrom, and to require the owners thereof to provide proper remedies for the prevention of fires.

Sec. 9 Sec. nine. It shall be the duty of the chief of the fire department to keep a book which shall be known as the fire record in which he shall keep a history of all fires occurring within the corporate limits of the town. Such record shall show the exact time that such fire started, the place where it sustained, and if any buildings were torn down, the [?] thereof, and the names of the fire wardens present and ordering the same.

Sec. 10 Sec. ten. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of section five of this ordinance shall not be eligible to be a marshal of any fire company, thereafter, in the town of Stillwater.

Sec. 11 Sec. eleven. If after the fire wardens have decided to tear down or pull [apart] any building or buildings, any person or persons shall by force or by threats try to prevent the fire officers from carrying out his orders or shall by force or threats try to prevent any person or persons from so tearing down or pulling [apart] such building, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than two nor more than ten dollars for such offense.

Sec. 12 Sec. twelve. In case of a fire, and where the fire company is called out, a member thereof who reports and [?] his duty, shall be paid for his services by the town in any sum of the discretion of the Town Trustees, provided that no one member shall receive more than four dollars for services performed at any one time.

AN ordinance prohibiting children from being on the streets and alleys of Stillwater, O.T., at night, unattended.

Sec. 1 It shall be unlawful for any children under the age of (15) fifteen years to be on the streets or alleys of the Town of Stillwater , Okla., unattended parent or guardian after (8:30) eight thirty o'clock p.m. from the 1st day of April to the 1st day of October, and (7:30) seven thirty o'clock p.m. from the 1st day of October to the 1st day of April of each year hereafter.

Sec. 2 If the parent or parents of any children under the age of (15) fifteen years or if any person or persons entrusted by law or otherwise with the care or custody of any child under the age of (15) fifteen years shall permit such child to be upon any of the streets or alleys of said town of Stillwater in violation of section one of this ordinance, they shall each be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum of not less than one dollar and not to exceed ten dollars.

Sec. 3 Any child or children over the age of (7) seven and under the age (15) fifteen years found on the streets or alleys of the town of Stillwater unattended by parent or guardian and in violation of section one of this ordinance shall in addition to the penalty fixe din section two of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum of not les than one dollar and not to exceed ten dollars.

Be it ordained by the president and board of trustees of the town of Stillwater, O. T.

Sec. 1 That a sidewalk shall be constructed on ninth avenue next and on the south side of block thirty-four and thirty-five. Said walk shall be commenced at and extend from the south east corner of block thirty four west to the south west corner of block thirty five, and shall be eight feet wide, except the street crossing, which shall be three feet wide. All monies collected by the street commission in time of poll tax shall be by him paid to the treasurer of said town and he shall take said treasurer's receipt therefor and such monies shall be kept in a separate fund by the treasurer for street improvements.

Sec. 4 The treasurer of the town of Stillwater shall receive a salary of twenty four dollars per year while he shall serve as such treasurer.

Be it ordained by the president and board of trustees of the Town of Stillwater, O. T.:

Section 1 That for the purpose of improving the streets of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory, as hereinafter mentioned, sidewalks are hereby ordered to be constructed upon and along that part of ninth, eighth, seventh, and third avenue, and Duck, [?], and Knoblock Streets, in and from and in college addition to said town, as hereinafter set forth, and crossing, all hereby ordered to be constructed at the intersections of said sidewalks with the streets and alleys of said town, also as hereinafter set forth and as follows, to wit:

Upon ninth avenue said sidewalk shall be constructed next to and in front of lots seventeen (17), eighteen (18), and nineteen (19) in block thirty five (35).

Upon eighth avenue, said sidewalks shall commence at the northeast corner of block thirty-one (31) and shall be constructed from there west along the north side and next to said block thirty-one (31) and block thirty-two (32) to the northwest corner of said block thirty-two (32).

Also commencing at the north east corner of block twenty-eight (28) said sidewalk shall be constructed from there west along the south side and next to said block twenty-eight (28) and blocks twenty seven (27) and twenty six (26) to the south west corner of said block twenty six (26)

Upon seventh avenue, said sidewalk shall commence at the north east corner of the block twenty eight (28) and to be constructed from there west along the north side of and next to said block twenty eight (28) and blocks twenty seven (27) and twenty six (26) to the north west corner of said block twenty six (26).

Upon such street said sidewalk shall commence at the south west corner of block thirty five (35) and shall be constructed from there north along the west side of and next to said block thirty-four. Also commencing at the south east corner of block twenty five (25) said sidewalk shall be constructed from there north along and next to said block twenty five (25) and block twenty two (22) and lots eleven and twelve (11 & 12) in Block "B". Also commencing at the south east corner of block twenty six (25) in College Addition to the town of Stillwater, said sidewalk shall be constructed from thence north along and next to blocks twenty six (26) and seventeen (17) and twelve (12) the north east corner of said block twelve (12).

Upon third avenue in College Addition to the said town of Stillwater, said sidewalk shall commence at the south east corner of block three (3) and be constructed from there west along and next to blocks three (3) and four (4) to the south west corner of block four (4).

Upon [Rusblock?] street in College Addition to the town of Stillwater, said sidewalk shall commence at the south-east corner of block five (5) and shall be constructed from there north along and next to said block five (5) to the north-east corner of lot five (5). Upon said block five (5), there [?] the sidewalk now leading to the Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Section 2 All of said sidewalk shall be [?] and shall be made of two inch hard pine lumber, with three stringers of 2 x 6 hard pine equally spaced underneath.

The top board shall not be over eight inches wide, and every board shall be spiked to each stringer with two, twenty penny spikes; except that the sidewalk along and in front of lots seventeen (17), eighteen (18), and nineteen (19) in block five (5). It shall be eight feet wide but shall be constructed in other respects as above described.

Section 3 All crossings shall be four feet wide and shall be made of oak board and spiked with two spikes in each board upon 2 x 4 oak stringers placed four feet apart.

Section 4 The cost of necessary grade and filling in the construction of said sidewalks and crossing is hereby included in the cost of said sidewalks and crossings and in the special tax hereafter levied for the improvement of said streets by the construction of said sidewalks and crossing.

Section 5 The total cost of the material in and the labor in the construction of said sidewalks and crossings, including the necessary grading and filling, is hereby estimated at \$3463.00, and for the purpose of defraying the cost of the construction of said sidewalks and crossings as aforesaid, there is hereby levied and assessed upon the lots fronting or abutting upon said sidewalks as proposed, a special ta of seventy five cents per front or abetting [?] said lots.

An ordinance to amend certain ordinances of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater.

Section 1. That certain ordinances of the Town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory, as hereinafter mentioned, be amended so as to read as follows, to wit:

That section 7, of Ordinance No. 3, passed January 2nd, 1895, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 7. Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, on conviction thereof, be fined not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars.

Section 2. That section 9 of Ordinance No. 5 passed January 2, 1895, be and the same is amended so as to read as follows, to wit:

“Sec. 9. Any person or persons, who shall be convicted of the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall for each offense be fined not less than five nor more than ten dollars.”

Section 3. That section 3, of Ordinance No. 6., passed January 2, 1895, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows, to-wit:

“Sec. 3. Any person or persons who shall take possession of any stock impounded without first paying the fees for impounding the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars.”

Section 4. That section 7, of Ordinance No 10, passed January 2, 1895, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows, to wit:

“Sec. 7. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars. Provided, however, in case the license required exceeds the sum of ten dollars, then such party may be fined in a sum not to exceed the equivalent of the license required.”

Section 5. That section No. 2, of Ordinance NO. 12, passed January 9, 1895, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 2. Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than five nor more than ten dollars for every day that he or they shall run or operate such dray or wagon, without first obtaining such license.”

Section 6. That section No. 2 of Ordinance No. 13, passed January 9, 1895, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the town Marshal to compel compliance with this ordinance, and any person who shall resist said Marshal or refuse to comply with this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, fined not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars.

Section 7. That section Nos. 1, 2 and 3, of Ordinance No. 15, passed January 9, 1895, be, each of them, and the same are hereby amended so as to provide for a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars, but in other respects said sections shall be unchanged.

Section 8. That section No. 1 of Ordinance No. 17, passed January 9, 1895, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 1. If any person within the corporate limits of the town of Stillwater shall be found in a state of intoxication in a public place he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and any peace officer may, without a warrant, and it is hereby made his duty to take said person into custody, and detain him in some suitable place until an information can be made before some magistrate, and a warrant issued in form upon which he may be arrested and tried, and if found guilty he shall pay a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars.”

Section 9. That section No. 10, of Ordinance No. 18, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 10. That any person who shall let any dog run at large without a muzzle during the time within which the president of the board of trustees shall order the muzzling of all dogs, or shall allow any dog to run at large, without a tag, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars.”

Section 10. That section number one of Ordinance No. 20, passed January 9th, 1895, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 1. Any person or persons who shall leave standing on any street or alley within the corporate limits of said town any horse or team attached to any vehicle without hitching them shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars.”

Section 11. That section number one of Ordinance No. 21, passed January 9, 1895, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 1. Any person or persons who shall ride any bicycle, tricycle or velocipede on the sidewalks of the town of Stillwater, O. T., shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars.”

Section 12. That sections Nos. 4 and 5, of Ordinance No. 22, passed January 9, 1895, be, each of them, and the same are hereby amended so as to provide for a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars, but said sections shall, in other respects, be unchanged.

Section 13. That section 1 and 2, of Ordinance NO. 23, passed January 9, 1895, be, each of them, and the same are hereby amended so as to provide for a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars, but said sections shall, in all other respects, be unchanged.

Section 14. That section No. 2 of Ordinance No. 25, passed January 9, 1895, so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 2. Any person guilty of violating section 1 of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars.”

Section 15. This Ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage and publication.

An ordinance amending sections one, two, four and five of Ordinance number 33, of the town of Stillwater, O. T., passed on the second day of July, 1897.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory.

Section 1. That Section number one of Ordinance number 33 of the town of Stillwater, O. T., passed on the 2nd day of July, 1897, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 1 Each member of the Board of Trustees of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory, shall receive for his full compensation for services as such trustees the sum of one dollar for each and every meeting of said board of trustees.”

Sec. 2. That section number two of the above named ordinance be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“The Marshal of the town of Stillwater, O. T., shall receive a salary of forty dollars per month, payable monthly, during good behavior and while he faithfully and efficiently performs the duties of his office. He shall also receive a fee of seventy five cents for each and every dog killed and buried by him in the proper discharge of his duty. He shall also charge and receive such fees as are or may be provided by law for constables or sheriffs in similar cases, and all fees collected by him shall be by him paid immediately to the treasurer of said town and he shall take the said treasurer’s receipt therefor.”

Sec. 3 - That section number four of the said above named ordinance be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 4 - The treasurer of the town of Stillwater shall receive a salary of six dollars per month, payable monthly, while he shall serve as such treasurer.”

Sec. 4 - That section number five of said above named ordinance be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

“Sec. 5 - The Clerk of the town of Stillwater, O. T., shall receive for his services a salary of eight dollars per month, payable monthly, while he shall serve as such Clerk.

Sec. 6 - This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

Ordinance No. 38

An ordinance prohibiting gambling and the maintenance of gambling devices in the town of Stillwater.

Be it ordained by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Town of Stillwater, O. T.

Sec. 1 - It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, within the limits of the town of Stillwater, Oklahoma Territory, to deal, play, carry on, conduct, open or cause to be opened, whether as owner, partner or employee, whether for hire or not, any game of faro, monte, poker, roulette, crapps, or any banking or percentage game played with dice, cards, or any device, for money, checks, credit, or any representative of value; or to keep, own, lease, maintain, manage or control, any table, device, machinery, paraphernalia or layout, which is used or intended to be used in the playing of any game upon which money or its representative is usually wagered.

Sec. 2 - It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to keep, own, lease, maintain, manage or control any slot machine of such a kind as, by the rules, directions or mechanism thereof, does not, upon every deposit of money therein, return to the person making such deposit, at least the ordinary equal value of the amount of money so deposited.

Sec. 3. - It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to wager, bet or stake any money or representative thereof, upon any game of chance or of skill; or to engage in playing any game mentioned in section one of this ordinance or any other game of chance or any game of skill, wherein money, its representative, or any thing of value, shall be wagered, bet or staked upon the result of said game; or to deposit any money in any slot machine such as is mentioned in section two of this ordinance.

Sec. 4 - Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance or of any section thereof, shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than five dollars and not more than ten dollars.

Sec. 5 - Ordinance number seven, passed January 2, 1895, and all amendments thereof, and all ordinance in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6 - This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its publication as provided by law.

Ordinance No. 40.

An ordinance granting to the Arkansas Valley Telephone company, its successors and assigns, the right to build, operate and maintain telephone lines in the town of Stillwater, Payne County, Oklahoma territory, and regulating the business of said company in said town.

Be it ordained, by the president and board of trustees of the town of Stillwater, Payne County, Oklahoma territory:

Sec. 1. That the right of way be and the same is hereby granted the Arkansas Valley Telephone company, its successors and assigns, to locate, construct and maintain telephone lines and all wires, poles, mains, viaducts, gutters and man-holes along, in through, under and across the public street, avenue, alley or bridge and viaduct in the town of Stillwater, Payne county, territory of Oklahoma, for the purpose of operating a telephone exchange and telephone lines and offering and rendering the usual facilities and services which such telephone liens and telephone exchanges afford, Provided said lines, poles and wires shall so be placed with reference to streets, avenues, alleys, sewers, viaducts, bridges, and other electrical lines, as to occasion no unreasonable inconvenience or obstruction. All such locations are to be made subject to the reasonable direction and approval of the legislative authorities of the said town or city of Stillwater.

Sec. 2. Whenever the poles of the said company shall be set in an alley, they shall eb placed as near the sides of said alley as is practicable, and in such a manner as to occasion no unreasonable inconvenience to the public or adjoining property owners.

Whenever such poles are located on streets or avenues, they shall be placed in all cases when practicable, on the outside edge of the sidewalk immediately inside of the curbstone and on the line dividng the lots one from the other; and no case shall they, or the wires thereon, be placed so as to interfere with any sewer or any other part of the drainage system of the town or city, nor, with the free use of said streets, avenues, alleys, bridges or other public highways by the public for travel or transportation.

Sec. 3. No electric light wires or electric motor wires, of any other person or company shall, when originally placed, be located within four feet of the wires in the open air of the said Arkansas Valley telephone company; and no such electric light and motor wires shall be originally located so as to parallel the wires of the Arkansas Valley telephone company upon the same side of the street for a greater distance than 300 feet unless such electric and motor wires shall be properly insulated and supplied with proper metallic return circuits; and no such electric light or motor wires shall, in any event be so originally located so as to interfere to any unreasonable degree with the effective working of the wires of the said company.

Whenever the liens of electric light, telegraph or motor companies or other electric light plants, save as herein excepted, shall be strung at an angel across the wires of the Arkansas Valley Telephone company where a crossing is necessary, they shall so cross at a right angle, and shall not, in any case, be allowed to approach the wires of the said Arkansas Valley Telephone company nearer than four feet.

In case of the violation of the requirements of this section it shall be the duty of the president of the board of trustees or of the mayor to notify the offending company or party to remove its wire so erected or located in violation hereof within three days of said notification, and on failure to comply with such notification the municipal authorities shall forthwith take proper steps to secure the removal of such wires at the expense of the offending

company or party. Provided that this section shall not apply to any wires used exclusively by the municipal authorities of said town or city of Stillwater.

Sec. 4. The rights and privileges hereby granted to the said company shall be for the period of twenty years and until terminated by a resolution of the municipal legislative authorities of the town or city of Stillwater, upon six months notice to be served upon the managing agent or employee in charge of Stillwater.

Sec. 5. The town or city of Stillwater, shall at all times, have the use of all telephone for fire alarm and police purposes free of charge, and in addition thereto the said company shall erect and maintain, under the direction of the legislative authorities of the town or city of Stillwater, free of charge for local or toll line charges one telephone of the best make, for the use of the municipal authorities of said town or city in exclusively municipal matters or business of said town or city.

Sec. 6. The Arkansas Valley Telephone company shall remove its wires after twenty-four hours' notice on request of the president of the board of trustees or of the mayor, to permit the removing of buildings along the streets, such removal of wires to be, in every instance, at the expense of the party for whose benefit or convenience such removal is made, such party to be determined upon and designated by the said president of the board of trustees or the mayor of said town or city, but this section shall not apply to the removal of any buildings belonging to the said town or city of Stillwater and necessary or convenient to the administration of the affairs of the said town or city.

Sec. 7. The maximum rate for the monthly use of a telephone shall be two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) per month for a business house and one dollars and fifty cents (\$1.50) for a private residence. Provided, that the maximum rate for the use of one business telephone and one resident telephone to the same person shall be three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50) per month and Provided, further, that such rates shall not exceed these which may hereafter be fixed by any law of the territory or state of Oklahoma in the regulation of telephone or telegraph companies nor shall the rates charged by said company to the citizens of said town or city of Stillwater ever exceed the lowest rates charged by said company to the citizens of any other town or city of the territory or state of Oklahoma for local or toll services of a similar character, unless the rate fixed for such other town or city shall be temporarily fixed below cost to said company for the purpose of meeting competition of some other company.

Sec. 8. Any person who shall at any time carelessly or willfully injure, damage or destroy or deface the structures or property of the said Arkansas Valley Telephone company, its successors and assigns, located, constructed and operated for the purpose set forth in this ordinance, or who shall in any manner interrupt or interfere with such telephonic communication, or telephone plant or business, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars and not more than fifty dollars.

Sec. 9. The telephone instruments placed and maintained by said company shall be of the most approved and efficient pattern and make and such as to afford a high grade of service, equal in all respects to the service furnished by said company to any other town or city in the territory or state of Oklahoma during the life of this franchise. All poles erected by said company shall be of spruce or cedar and shapely and symmetrical in appearance, and all work in and about the establishment and maintenance of the plant of the said company and all service by the employees of said company, in their relation to the public, shall be prompt and thoroughly efficient.

Sec. 10. Within one year from the date thereof, and as soon as a railroad shall be built to the said town of Stillwater, the said company shall furnish to the public, and maintain, a central office disconnected from any other business and supplied with such conveniences as will enable the patrons of said company to communicate over the telephone lines of said company without their conversation being overheard by other patrons or by the employees of the said company at said central office.

Sec. 11. All telegram transmitted by the employees of said company shall, when requested by sender, be transmitted privately and not within the hearing of any other persons.

Sec. 12. Within thirty days from [the date] thereof, said company shall establish and put in place [?] a special commercial rate for [?] services for the benefit of such patrons [?] more than ordinary extent, the [?] of said company, such commercial rate to [?] less than the charge to the general public [?] such reasonable regulation as said company may require. And said company [?] keep in force ins aid town or city a special commercial rate as low as that furnished to the patrons of any other town or city in the Territory or State of Oklahoma, unless such rate shall be a competitive rate as mentioned in section seven (7).

Sec. 13. The municipal authorities of said town or city of Stillwater shall have the right [?] to order the removal to such reasonable placed as they may designate, of any of the [?] or wires of said company when such removal shall be necessary or convenient in the administration of said town or city. Such removal shall eb made by said company within a reasonable time after written note shall be served upon the managing agent or employee in charge of said company's business at said town or city of Stillwater, and such removal shall be at the expense of said company.

Sec 14. All roles and regulations established by said company for the regulation of the business between said company and the public shall be reasonable, and no rules, regulations or agreements shall be established or attempted to be enforced which seek to relieve said company from any of the obligations and duties which the law and public policy impose upon said company as a common carrier of messages.

Sec. 15. All complaints made to the managing agent or employee in charge of said company's business at said town or city of Stillwater by any patron, of inefficiency of service, lack of repair overcharge, discourtesy, or any improper act or abuse upon the part of said company or its employees, or of any violation of any of the obligations imposed upon said company by this ordinance, shall be immediately investigated and remedied if found to exist by such managing agent or employee in charge if within his province to adjust, and if not, then such complaint shall be immediately reported by such agent or employee to the manager of said company having such matters in charge and such complain shall be immediately investigated by said company, and the cause thereof promptly removed if the same exists.

Sec. 16. Reasonable facilities shall, at all times, be furnished to the public by said company for Sunday service in matters of necessity or charity.

Sec. 17. All poles erected by said company shall be kept in sound condition and not suffered to become rotten or in danger of falling and all rotten and unsound poles shall be promptly removed and replaced with some other when [?] when complain shall be made as provided herein.

Sec. 18. The use of the streets and allies, etc., hereby granted to said company shall at all times be subject to the reasonable regulations of the legislative authorities of said town ro city, by ordinance, and all such ordinances may be changed at pleasure by said authorities.

Sec. 19. Any willful and continued violation of any of the duties or obligation imposed upon said company by this ordinance, when such violation shall be brought to the attention of the central managing authority of said company, shall, in the option of the legislative authorities of said town or city by ordinance expressed, work a forfeiture of the franchise and privileges granted said company by this ordinance. Provided, that said company shall not be held accountable under this section for the consequences arising from unforeseen accidents, or loss, damaged, delay, or inconvenience caused by the work of the elements or by the necessity of a removal of the offices of said company or its poles or wires when such directs are remedied within a reasonable time.

Sec. 20. All expenses incurred by the same town of Stillwater in the drafting, passage and publication of this ordinance shall be paid upon the passage of this ordinance by said company.

Sec. 21. All ordinances, or parts fo the same, in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 22. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force form and after its passage and publication.

“Sec. 3. Auction establishments and the sale of bankrupt, assignees and itinerant stocks of goods, wares and merchandise at auction shall not be included within section one of this ordinance. Every person, firm or corporation before opening such auction established, or commencing an auction sale of said goods shall procure from the town Clerk a license therefor, and shall pay to the clerk therefor the sum of fifty dollars for each and every day, or part thereof, for the time said sale shall continue.”

Sec. 2. An emergency si hereby declared for the immediate taking effect of this ordinance. The publishing of this ordinance is hereby dispensed with and this ordinance shall be in force and take effect upon its passage and approval.
